

Primary Grammar: Don't, Doesn't

We use '**do not**' and '**does not**' when asking a question in a negative manner. We use '**do not**' when the subject is I, you, we or they. We use '**does not**' when the subject is, he, she or it. We can shorten '**do not**' to '**don't**' and '**does not**' to '**doesn't**'.
